Crabapples marked with a ^ have shown a good or better disease resistance to the four major Crabapple diseases: Scab, Fireblight, Cedar Apple Rust and Frogeye Leaf Spot.

The largest shrub-type lilacs we offer are represented by three distinct groups: the *S. vulgaris* cultivars (frequently called French hybrids), the *S. x hyacinthiflora* cultivars and the *S. x prestoniae* cultivars. The following is a description of each type:

### ***S. vulgaris* cultivars**

These cultivars are usually large shrubs that produce fragrant panicle flowers. The *S. vulgaris* types typically flower in mid-spring, with colors varying from white to deep purple.

### ***S. x hyacinthiflora* cultivars**

These cultivars result from the crossing of *S. oblata* (Early Lilac) and *S. vulgaris*. These extremely hardy lilacs flower about a week to ten days prior to the *S. vulgaris* cultivars. They tend to flower more heavily and consistently with very fragrant flowers produced on large panicles similar to those of the *S. vulgaris* cultivars. Unlike the *S. vulgaris* cultivars, they form a dense, rounded or mounded shrub of 8-15 feet that is full to the base.

### ***S. x prestoniae* cultivars**

These cultivars result from the crossing of *S. villosa* and *S. reflexa*. These extremely hardy, late blooming lilacs flower in June, about two weeks after the *S. vulgaris* cultivars, thereby extending the lilac season. They form dense, mounded shrubs of 6-10 feet in height which lend them to many landscape situations.
